Speaker Bios

Mike Garvey – a Montana Native, is the owner of Garvey’s Urban Forest LLC. He has 26 years of field experience observing, planting and managing trees in challenging environments of the Northern Plains and the Rocky Mountains of Montana. He uses this experience as a basis for his arboricultural practice where he specializes in tree risk assessment, evaluation and hazard identification; tree inventories and appraisals; writing plant health care management programs; forensic investigations and tree disorder diagnostics, he serves as an expert witness in court cases relating to tree issues and also does public speaking and educational forums.

Dr. Karen Panter – has been a UW Extension Horticulture Specialist since joining the Plant Sciences Department in August of 1998. Prior to that she had served 10 years in a multi-county area as a Greenhouse Specialist for CSU Extension. Along with her Extension work Dr. Panter also teaches subjects including plant propagation and greenhouse production to undergraduate as well as graduate students. Karen has what is called a three way split, which means on top of the other duties, she also a responsibility to do research in her subject matter for the citizens of Wyoming and growers across the state. Her research includes specialty crops such as cut flower production and fresh herb production.

Scott Skogerboe – has been the head propagator for Fort Collins Wholesale Nursery for the last 24 years. During those years he has grown over 3 million trees and shrubs. His father was from a pioneer family who came to Crook County, Wyoming in 1887. He has some fascinating stories about the High Plains Arboretum near Cheyenne, as he befriended the last Horticulturist from the USDA Research Station after graduate school at CSU. His passion for propagating overlaps into his personal life where he has a side business that produces some of the best varieties of apples for our High Plains environments and includes keeping alive trees from the last know original Johnny Appleseed trees.
